

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1. INTRODUCTION

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4. LOCATION



SEC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc. These may be chosen for a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skillbased knowledge. Each of the AECC and SEC courses shall carry 4 Credits.

- (A) Bachelor's Certificate: The Bachelor's Certificate in a discipline is obtainable after 1 year (two semesters) of study. A Bachelor's Certificate in a discipline may be awarded if a student studies 4 core papers in that discipline, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), 2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and 4 Value Addition Courses (VAC), with the completion of courses equal to a minimum of 46 Credits.
- (B) **Bachelor's Diploma:** The Bachelor's Diploma in a discipline is obtainable after 2 years (four semesters) of study. A Bachelor's Diploma in a discipline may be awarded if a student studies 10 core papers in that discipline, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), 2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), 6 Value Addition Courses (VAC) and 2 Generic Elective Course (GEC), with the completion of courses equal to a minimum of 96 Credits.
- (C) **Bachelor's Degree:** The Bachelor's Degree in a discipline is obtainable after 3 years (Six semesters) of study. A Bachelor's degree (i.e., B.Sc/B.A./B.Com) in a discipline degree may be awarded if a student studies 14 core papers in that discipline, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), 2 Skill Enhancement Course (SEC), 8 Value Addition Courses (VAC), 2 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses and 4 Generic Elective (GE) courses, with the completion of courses equal to a minimum of 140 Credits.

14. SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

1. Continuous Internal Evaluation:

The College conducts Combined Class Tests (FCCT), Unit tests, Internal Assessment Examination.

2. End Semester Examinations:

- a. There shall be theory and Practical examination at the end of each semester, ordinarily during December-January for odd semesters and during June-July for even semesters.
- b. The University holds the end semester examination for the courses/papers under core Course (CC), Discipline Specific Elective Course (DSE), Generic Elective Course (GEC), Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). Such examination shall be held as per the syllabus currently in force.
- c. Practical examination shall be conducted at the end of each semester. They shall be conducted by two examiners, one internal and one external. The candidate shall submit the record book for practical examination duly certified by the course teacher and the HOD/staff in-charge before the examiners for assessment and evaluation.
- d. A theory paper having 4 credits shall have the end semester examination for 3 credits/75 marks and internal assessment for 1 credit/25 marks.
- e. A theory paper having 5 credits shall have the end semester examination for 4 credit/100 marks and internal assessment for 1 credit/25 marks.
- f. The pass marks for all theory/practical/tutorial papers in an end semester examination shall be 40%.
- g. If a candidate secures pass marks in practical paper (s)/tutorials but fails to secure pass marks in theory paper(s), the marks of practical paper(s)/tutorials along with Internal Assessment shall be retained.

15. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Medium of instructions for all courses other than language-based courses (eg. Manipuri, Hindi etc.), shall be English.
- 2. All candidates shall write their answers in English for all courses other than language-based courses.

E. Transfer of Admission:

Transfer of admissions is permissible only for odd semesters for students of other universities and within the University.

F. Conditions for transfer of admission of students within the University:

- 1. Transfer admission shall be within the intake permitted to the college.
- 2. Availability of same combination of subjects studied in the previous college.

G. Conditions for transfer admission of students of other Universities:
